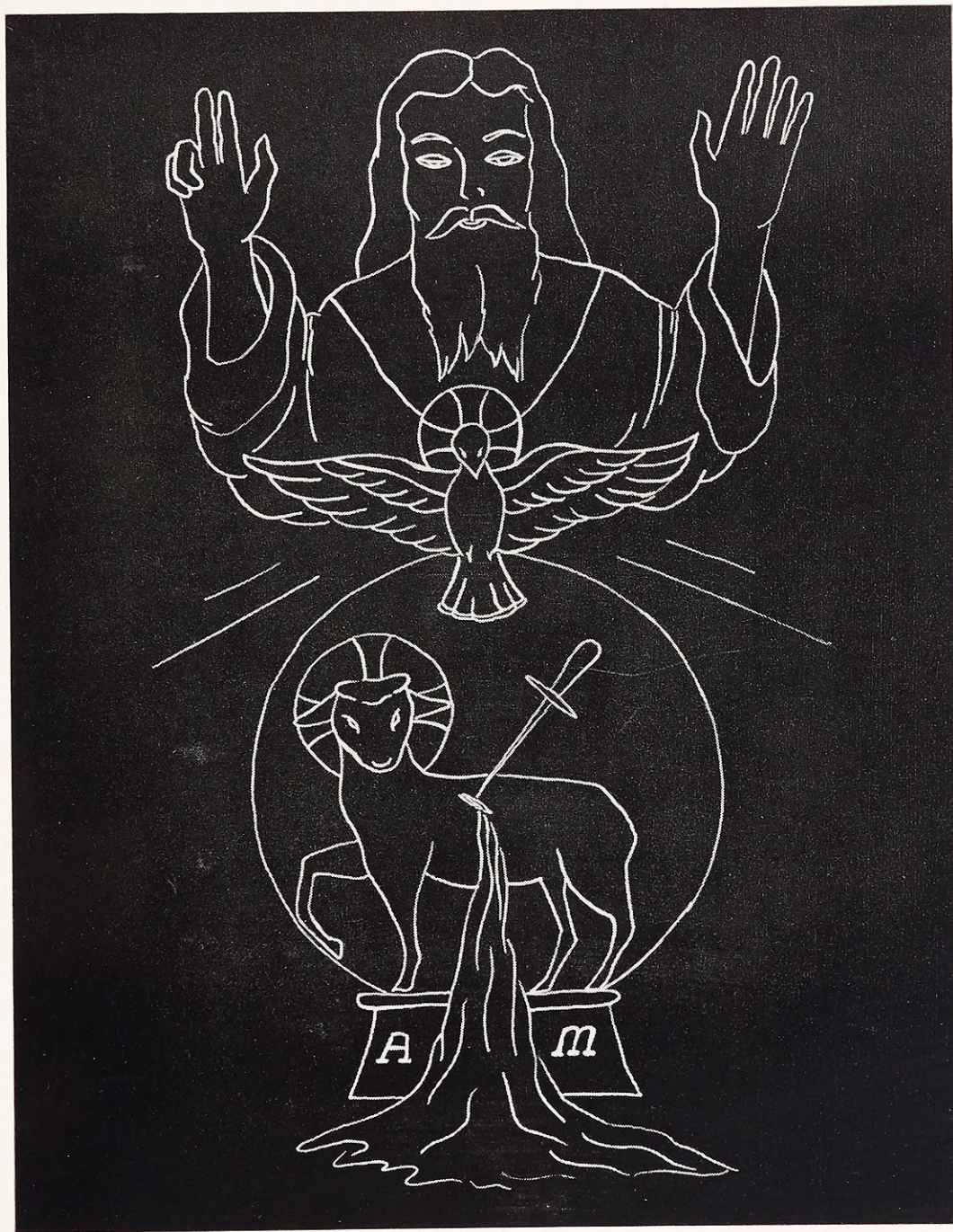
Curricular

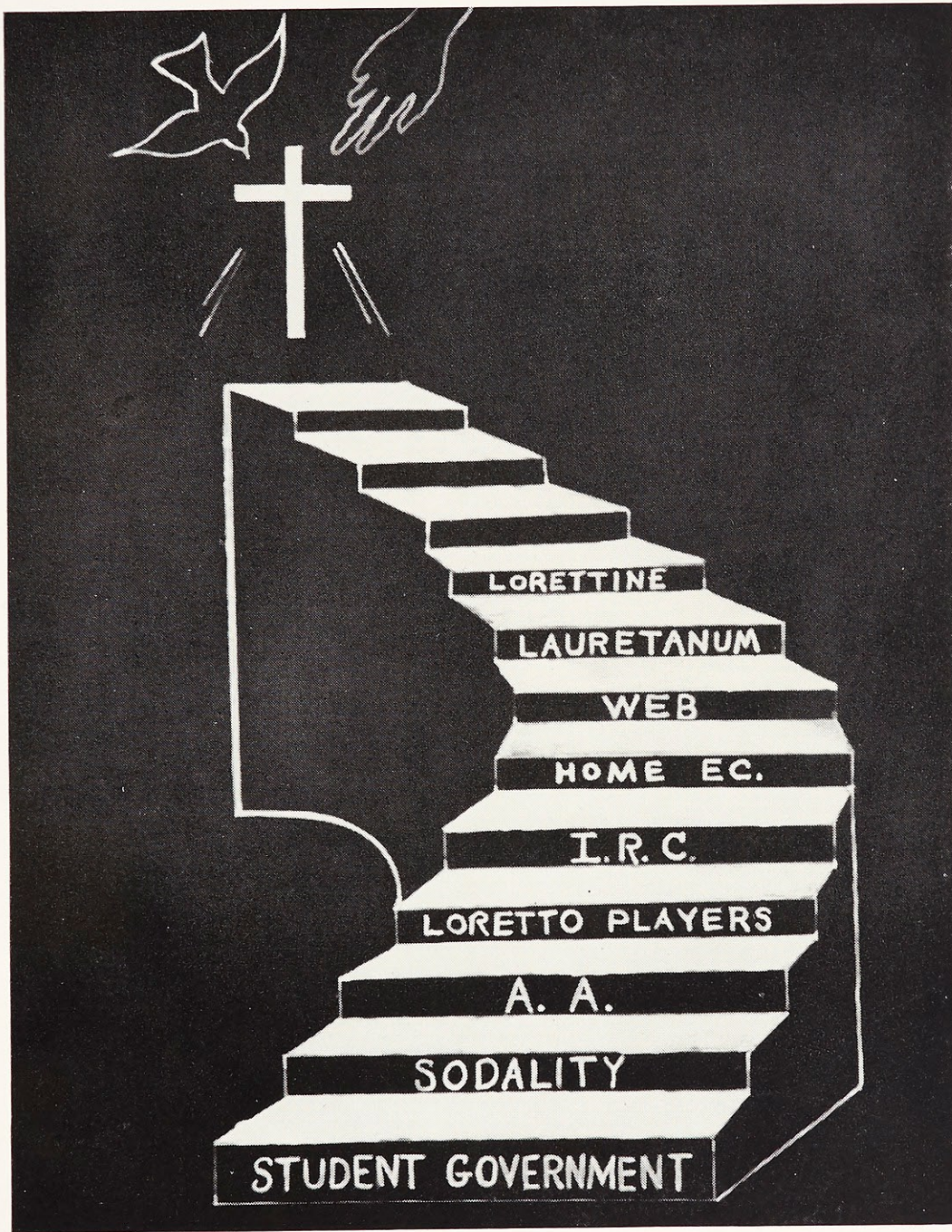


Co - Curricular

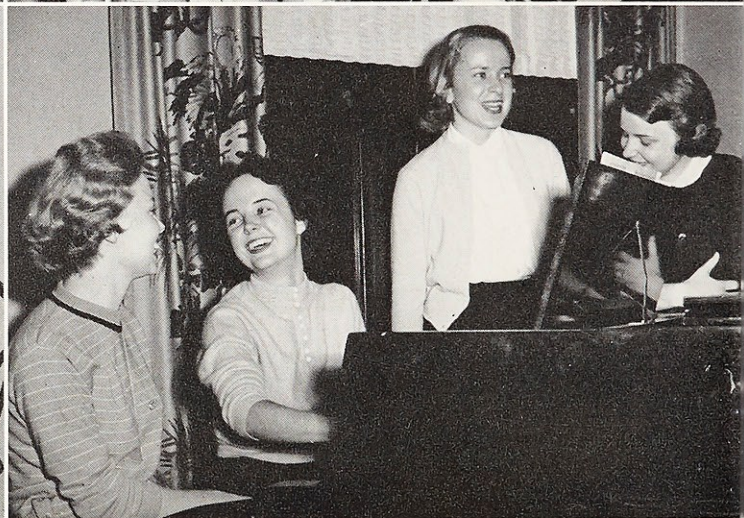

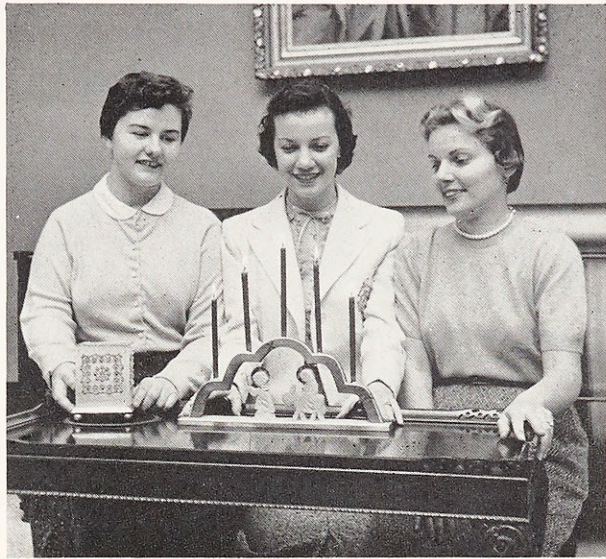


Freshman Week Board

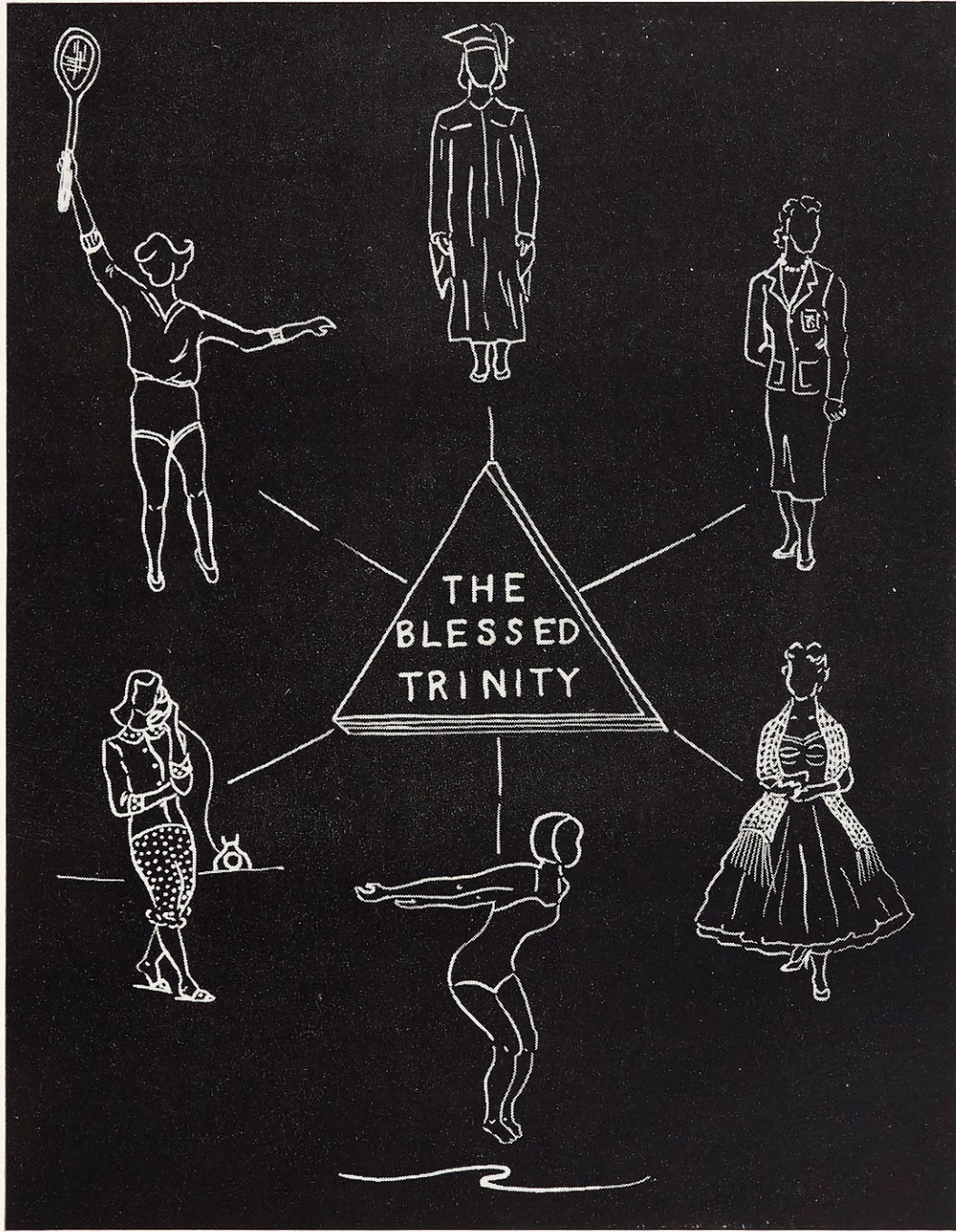

So let us, humankind, ever strive to model ourselves after the Holy Trinity; different persons within a single nature, with a single purpose.

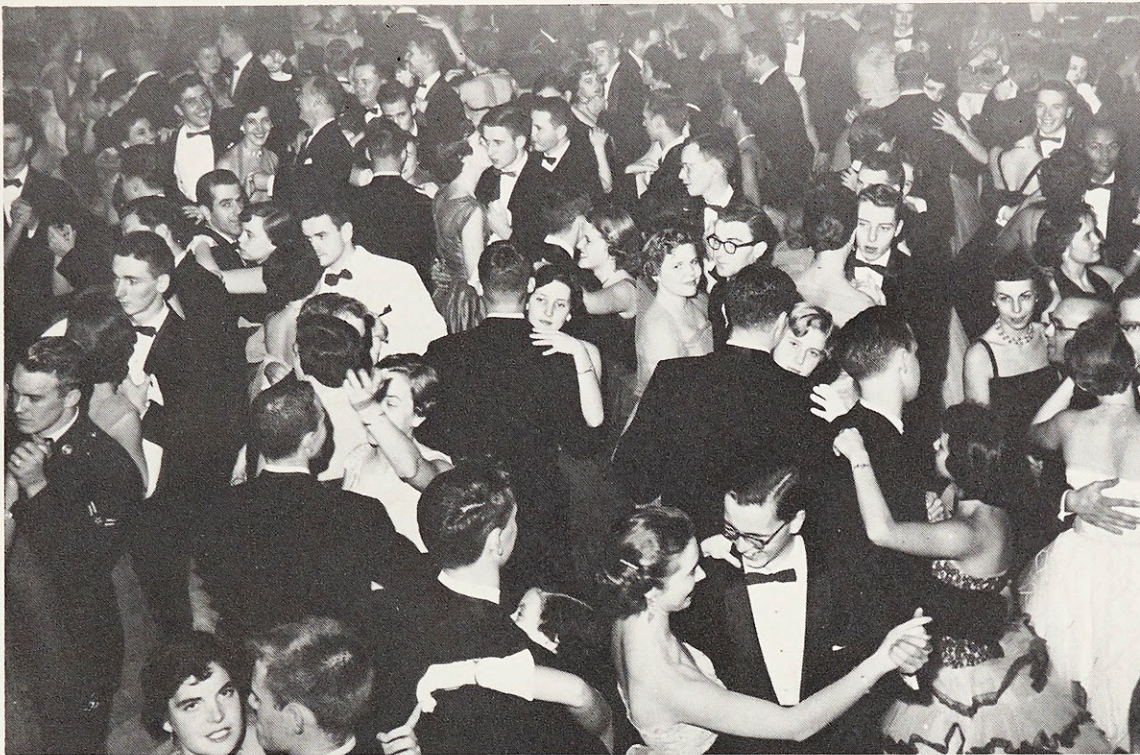

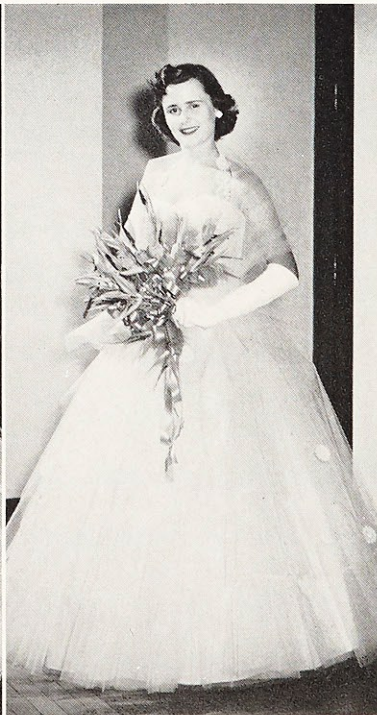
